2019 was a year of growth and outreach for the St. Clair County Health Department (SCCHD). As our resources grow, so does our ability to facilitate and support the needs of the community and the public health system as a whole. This system is much more than just our local governmental agency. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), it includes all the “public, private, and voluntary entities that contribute to the delivery of essential public health services in a jurisdictions, agencies, services and programs that impact a person’s life.” This concept ensures that all entities' contributions to the health and well-being of the community or state are recognized in assessing the provision of public health services.

This concept was clearly operationalized this year with the completion and distribution of the St. Clair County’s first Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). An evidence based community wide strategic planning process called “MAPP” (Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnerships) was utilized to collect data, community input and develop priorities and measurable outcomes from a broad range of community stakeholders. The CHIP is intended for ALL community agencies and programs to align their goals and objectives to the issues prioritized in the Plan, and our hope is that everyone finds it a useful compass for the next 5 years.

SCCHD also reviewed and updated our own strategic plan and revised our vision and mission statements to reflect this integrative approach.

We are grateful for the support of our Board of Health, the County Administration Controller, Karry Hepting, and our elected local and state officials. Additionally, the interactions with both traditional and non-traditional partners has provided a broad framework to find solutions to our health issues. Together we are making St. Clair County a great place to live, work and play!

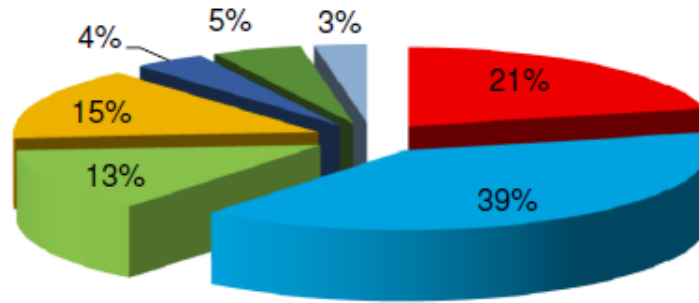

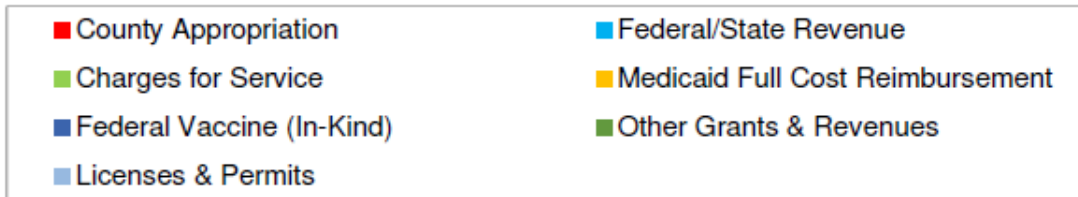

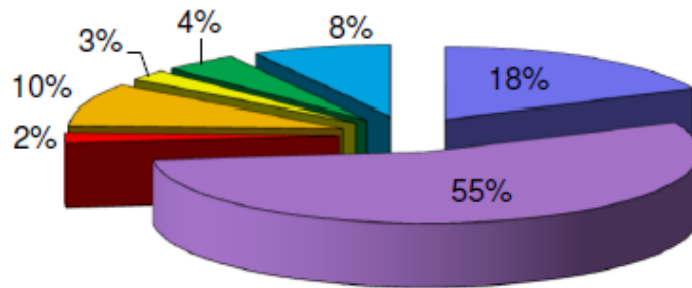
2019 Health Department Revenues



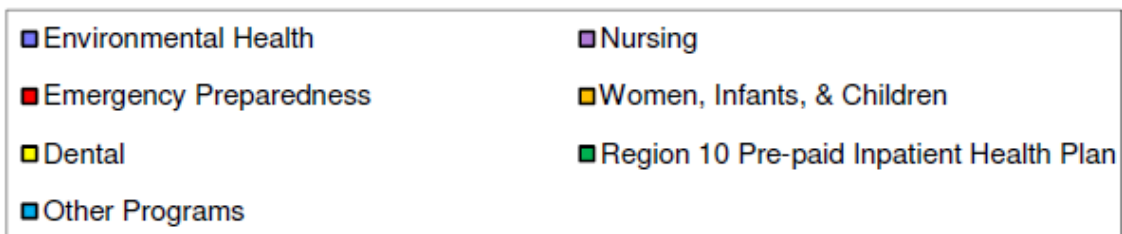
Total Revenues: \$7,969,400



2019 Health Department Expenditures



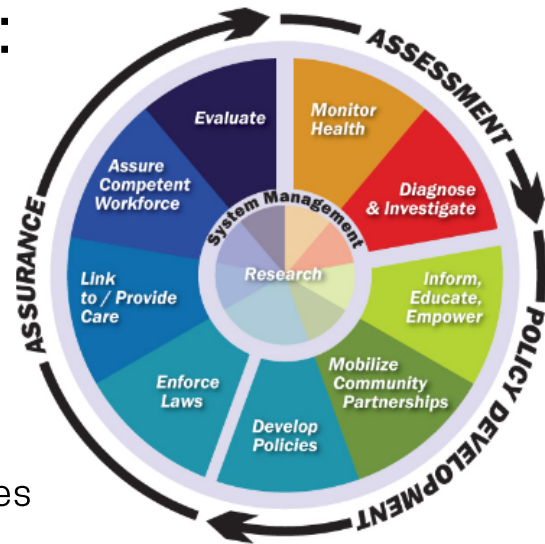
Total Expenditures: \$7,742,815



10 ESSENTIAL PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICES

The 10 Essential Public Health Services describe the public health activities that all community should undertake:

1. Monitor health status to identify and solve community health problems
2. Diagnose and investigate health problems and health hazards in the community
3. Inform, educate, and empower people about health issues
4. Mobilize community partnerships and action to identify and solve health problems
5. Develop policies and plans that support individual and community health efforts
6. Enforce laws and regulations that protect health and ensure safety
7. Link people to needed personal health services and assure the provision of health care when otherwise unavailable
8. Assure competent public and personal health care workforce
9. Evaluate effectiveness, accessibility, and quality of personal and population-based health services
10. Research for new insights and innovative solutions to health problems



PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICE # 1

Monitor health status to identify and solve community health problems

Smoking Cessation and Reduction in Pregnancy Treatment (SCRIPT)

According to the 2016 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA), nearly 30% of pregnant women smoke in St. Clair County. This is a higher rate than the state of Michigan. In October 2019, the Maternal Infant Health Program implemented a program to help women stop smoking and have healthier pregnancies. Clients have been open and welcoming to the one-on-one support and educational material they receive from their nurse. SCRIPT is already having an impact on St. Clair County mothers and their families.



Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP)

From 2018 - 2019 various stakeholders met to discuss community health and problems. Stakeholders went through a strategic planning process to develop our county's first CHIP. The CHIP outlines how partners intend to improve health of all residents over the next five years. There are strategies to address: chronic disease prevention and management, access to health care, substance abuse, mental health, well-being of children and adolescents, economic opportunity, and environmental health. Harm Reduction

St. Clair County has seen rapidly rising hepatitis C rates in the young adult population, related mostly to intravenous drug use. In 2019, harm reduction interventions were implemented to reduce hepatitis C and HIV. Harm reduction is a set of strategies to reduce the negative consequences associated with drug use.

The Health Department started offering:

- Rapid hepatitis C testing on and offsite
- Syringe services program (SSP) called The ExChange
- Linkage to care program to connect those with hepatitis C to medical providers, education, support and more
- Opioid overdose recognition and response training, including Narcan® distribution

Diagnose and investigate health problems and health hazards in the community

Measles, Mumps, Rubella...Oh, My!

Communicable disease outbreaks require Health Department staff to stop routine services to investigate and respond.

When there are suspect, probable, or confirmed cases of diseases or infections, the nursing staff are the first to know. After notification, a communicable disease investigation is conducted to determine (if possible) where/how the individual contracted the disease and communicate with their close family and friends to recommend appropriate post-exposure prophylaxis and implement control measures. Nursing leadership works with Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) to coordinate specimens for confirmatory testing.

Health education staff are responsible for alerting the public and the media when necessary about diseases and outbreaks. Often times this team writes media releases, updates the website, and creates social media posts to inform about the disease and if the public should take any action (such as getting vaccinated).

In March 2019, St. Clair County saw three probable cases of mumps. Mumps is a vaccine-preventable disease but can be contagious and is spread through saliva or mucus. Also in spring / early summer, southeast Michigan was experiencing a measles outbreak and St. Clair County was impacted. There was one case of confirmed measles in our community. Measles is another vaccine-preventable disease and is easily spread through the air.

Monitoring and stopping the spread of diseases is important for a healthy community.

Inform, educate, and empower people about health issues

WIC's 5th Annual Breastfeeding Stroll

WIC hosted the 5th annual Breastfeeding Stroll in August 2019 at the Blue Water River Walk. This year's stroll was attended by 19 vendors and approximately 100 participants. The purpose of the stroll is to honor breastfeeding month by empowering women to breastfeed and to provide breastfeeding information and resources.



Hepatitis A Outbreak

St. Clair County continued to be a part of the larger Michigan outbreak in 2019 and received additional grant funding for to promote the importance of hepatitis A prevention measures, such as handwashing and vaccination.

This campaign included another bus wrap and video, both highlighting handwashing, especially at public festivals and after using a porta-potty.

Mobilize community partnerships and action to identify and solve health problems

St. Clair County SPEAK

St. Clair County Substance Prevention through Early Action and Knowledge (SPEAK) is a newly formed substance use prevention coalition. Community stakeholders gathered at three day-long, intensive planning sessions to review Michigan Profile for Healthy Youth (MiPHY) data regarding youth substance use and create a five-year strategic plan. This group identified underage drinking, youth marijuana use, youth vaping, and adult opioid use as its four priority areas. St. Clair County Immunization Coalition



To address St. Clair County's poor immunization rates and high vaccine waiver rates, SCCHD is coordinating efforts to transition the current Adult Immunization Coalition to a broader community led coalition focusing on immunizations at all ages.

South East Michigan Women, Infant, and Children Engagement Project (SEMWICEP)

St. Clair County WIC is participating in a cross-jurisdictional collaborative project. This 3-5 year regional project aims to identify root causes for regional and statewide decrease WIC engagement, build community relationships, and define what "engagement" means for WIC participants. Strategic priorities for this group include:

- Shopping Experience-Vendor (store) collaboration
- Technology-Ease of problem access and participation
- Marketing and Awareness - Enrolling WIC participants



PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICE #5

Develop policies and plans that support individual and community health efforts

Children's Special Health Care Services (CSHCS)

CSHCS helps children (and some adults) with chronic, disabling or terminal medical conditions by providing coverage and referrals for specialty services. A Registered Nurse (RN) works with the family to identify clients' needs and barriers to care and to develop a Comprehensive Plan of Care.



HIV Prevention with PrEP



Pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) is a once daily HIV prevention pill for those who do not currently have HIV but are at a high risk of getting it through sex or injection drug use. Nursing leadership extensively research and planned for the implementation of PrEP distribution at SCCHD.

Expanded Long-Acting Reversible Contraception (LARC) Access

Intrauterine devices (IUDs) and implants are examples of effective LARC methods. These are the most effective reversible methods of contraception but have additional advantages of being long lasting (3+ years), liked by users, and cost effective.

Over 50% of pregnancies are unplanned. Stress, poverty, and health status can impact the pregnancy leading to premature delivery and/or infant and maternal mortality.



SCCHD prepared to expand LARC options available in the Personal Health Clinic. After policy development and extensive training for the Nurse Practitioner (NP), IUD and implant (Nexplanon®) insertion and removal is now offered.

PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICE #6

Enforce laws and regulations that protect health and ensure safety

Varicella "Chickenpox" Outbreak

In September 2019, there was a chickenpox (varicella) outbreak at a local high school. According to MDHHS guidelines, "Varicella outbreaks consist of 2 or more cases in a group activity setting (school, daycare, camp, etc.)."

SCCHD nursing staff implemented the proper outbreak protocol. The school district officials identified 37 susceptible, unvaccinated students. According to the Public Health Code, these students needed to be excluded from school and extracurricular activities for at least 21 days after the last identified case.

SCCHD and the school district worked together to protect the health of the community by stopping the spread of disease.

Beach Testing Program



From Memorial Day to Labor Day, the St. Clair County Health Department successfully completed another season of water quality monitoring at eight beaches on Lake Huron and the St. Clair River. Fifteen weeks of continuous water quality collection and analysis resulted in just three days of closure, making it one of St. Clair County's healthiest beach seasons on record.

St. Clair County beach samples submitted to the lab this summer will be analyzed over the winter to track the bacterial contamination source to humans or animals.

Improved water quality has been made possible by reducing pathogen sources through sewer separation projects, elimination of illicit discharges, and installation of green infrastructure along shorelines.

Link people to needed personal health services and assure the provision of health care when otherwise unavailable

Not Just a Number

Outreach staff are happy to help relieve the stress of finding resources for clients' needs, particularly when people have immediate needs that are coupled with a sense of urgency and desperation.

In 2019, Outreach helped several clients who had the very serious and frightening diagnosis of cancer to get the health insurance they needed to move forward with further testing and treatment as quickly as possible. Outreach also helped several families apply for emergency funds to avoid eviction and keep their heat on in the cold weather.

Many applicants are embarrassed that they have to ask for help, but they appreciate that when they come to SCCHD they are treated with dignity and compassion. Applicants appreciate that they are not just a number or name here; they matter.



Off Site Clinics

Nursing division has partnered with community agencies to offer immunizations, ExChange Kits, and hepatitis C testing at off site clinics. Staff attend annual events, like Senior Power Day and the Community Resource Fair. Clinics are also offered on a recurring basis at Harbor Impact Ministry and Mid City Nutrition.



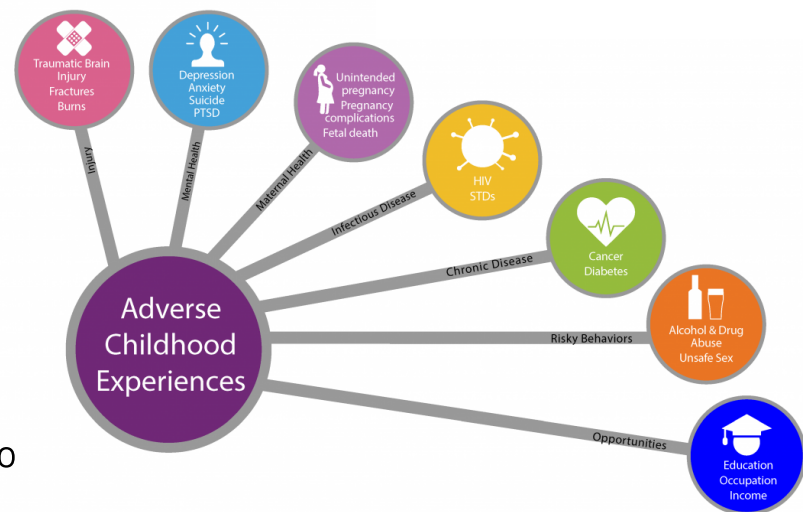

Assure competent public and personal health care workforce

Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs)

ACEs are potentially traumatic events that occur in childhood (before age 18) such as experiencing violence, abuse, or neglect; witnessing violence in the home; and having a family member attempt or die by suicide; growing up in a household with substance misuse, mental health problems, or instability due to parental separation or incarceration of a parent, sibling, or other household member. ACEs have been linked to risky health behaviors, chronic health conditions, low life potential, and early death. Learn more about ACEs [here](#).

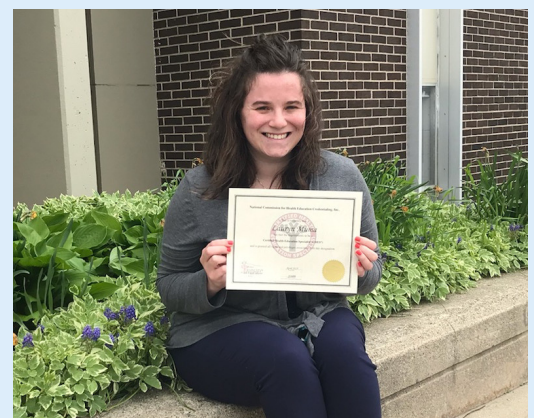
In March, Annette Mercatante, MD, MPH, Medical Health Officer became an ACE Master Training through a grant offered by the Michigan Association of Health Plans Foundation and the Michigan ACE Initiative. This allows her to educate others so that they may also give presentations on ACEs. Currently, key staff are being trained to also provide ACEs education. Childhood trauma was focused on during a monthly Health Department Staff Training so all employees can understand and recognize ACEs. Many other St. Clair County agencies have also been educated on this topic.

CHES Credential Earned

Health Educator, Lauryn Muma, MPH, took and passed the Certified Health Education Specialist (CHES) exam in spring 2019. This is offered by the National Commission for Health Education Credentialing (NCHEC). The CHES credential shows that Health Educators have met or exceeded standards for the field.



PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICE #9

Evaluate effectiveness, accessibility, and quality of personal and population-based health services

Client Evaluations

The Maternal Infant Health Program (MIHP) Coordinator reviews all nurse and social worker documentation following Initial Assessments and Discharge. The Coordinator chooses a random sample for the monthly peer chart review. Routinely throughout care, staff checks in with the client/caregiver if their needs are being met and documents the conversation and response on the Professional Visit Progress Note. At the discharge visit, client/caregiver receives a Client Evaluation Form to complete by the end of the client visit. All evaluations are reviewed by supervision and if indicated follow-up is implemented.

South East Michigan WIC Engagement Project (SEMWICEP)

The St. Clair County Health Department WIC hosted two regional collaborative meetings of the SEMIWICEP whose membership developed two separate surveys distributed to WIC clients asking them to evaluate their WIC services and their shopping experience. These survey results will inform strategies the collaborate will employ to enhance WIC service moving forward. The effectiveness of the strategies will be evaluated in the future.



Quality Improvement (QI) Initiative

One main goal for 2019 was to start quality improvement projects that involved all Health Department staff. In early 2019, a staff survey was sent out to identify areas of improvement. Survey results were used to start quality improvement projects within each division at the Health Department. QI meetings focus on improving different facets of the entire department to serve clients in a more efficient and effective manner.

Research for new insights and innovation solutions to health problems

CADCA Mid-Year Training Institute



Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America (CADCA) is a national organization that provides support, resources, and training to local substance use prevention coalitions. The 2019 CADCA Mid-Year Training Institute was held in Dallas, Texas and taught prevention specialists new tools and solutions to help coalitions succeed. Lisa Ruddy, BS, CHES®, St. Clair County SPEAK Coalition Coordinator was able to attend and learn practical tips to bring back to our community.

Cribs for Kids Conference

Liz King, BSN, RN, Nursing and Community Health Director, and Lauryn Muma, MPH, CHES®, Health Educator, attended the semi-annual Cribs for Kids Conference in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Cribs for Kids is a non-profit organization based in Pennsylvania. The conference focused on data surrounding sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS) and infant safe sleep fatalities. Staff were able to connect with national organizations and get ideas on how to promote safe sleep in St. Clair County. After the conference, SCCHD became a Cribs for Kids partner and is now able to distribute pack'n'plays to families in need.



Long-Acting Reversible Contraception (LARC) Training

Kristen Skoney, NP, traveled to Reno, Nevada to attend a LARC training. During this training, Kristen was trained in proper Intrauterine Device (IUD) insertion and removal. Due to this additional training, SCCHD is able to offer this service onsite in the Personal Health Clinic.

Barrier Analysis Report Released

St. Clair County SPEAK (formally known as the Prescription Drug Abuse Workgroup) completed a Barrier Analysis Report. Focus groups were conducted in 2018 to identify what barriers to prenatal and substance use disorder treatment exist in St. Clair County for pregnant women who are addicted to opioids. The group analyzed the information gathered and released the Barrier Analysis Report in 2019. Read the report [here](#).

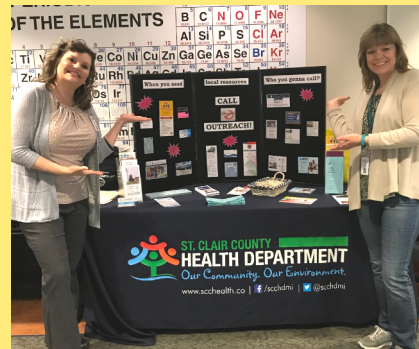

TESTING

The Health Department began offering hepatitis C testing in March 2019. Rapid testing results come back in 20 minutes and conventional testing results come back in 3 days. In May, staff began rapid hepatitis C testing offsite at community events, such as Community Resource Fair, Harbor Impact Days, Mid-City Nutrition, and Senior Power Day.

PREVENTION

The Health Department opened a Syringe Services Program (SSP) called The Exchange in March 2019. SSPs are evidence-based ways to reduce hepatitis C and HIV rates by providing sterile syringes and equipment to people who inject drugs (PWID). SSPs also help PWID get other needed services, such as Narcan®, sexually transmitted infection (STI) testing, and other resources.

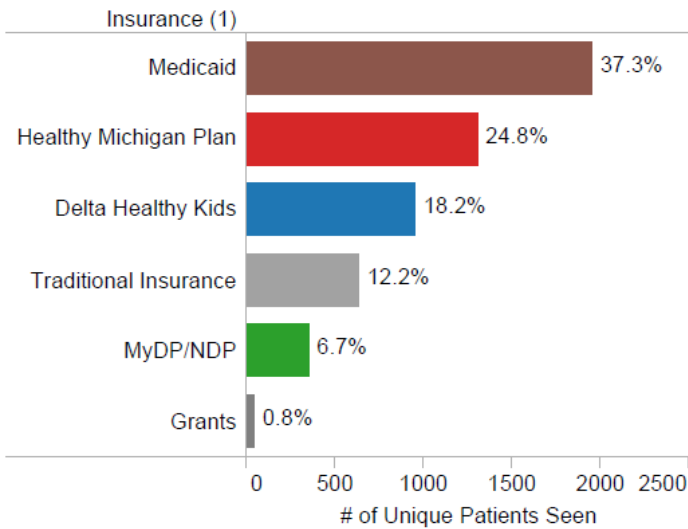

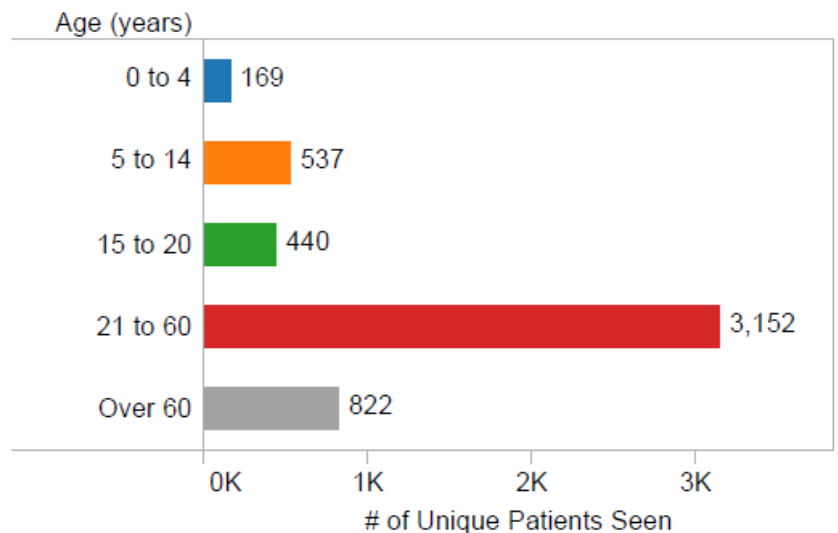
