



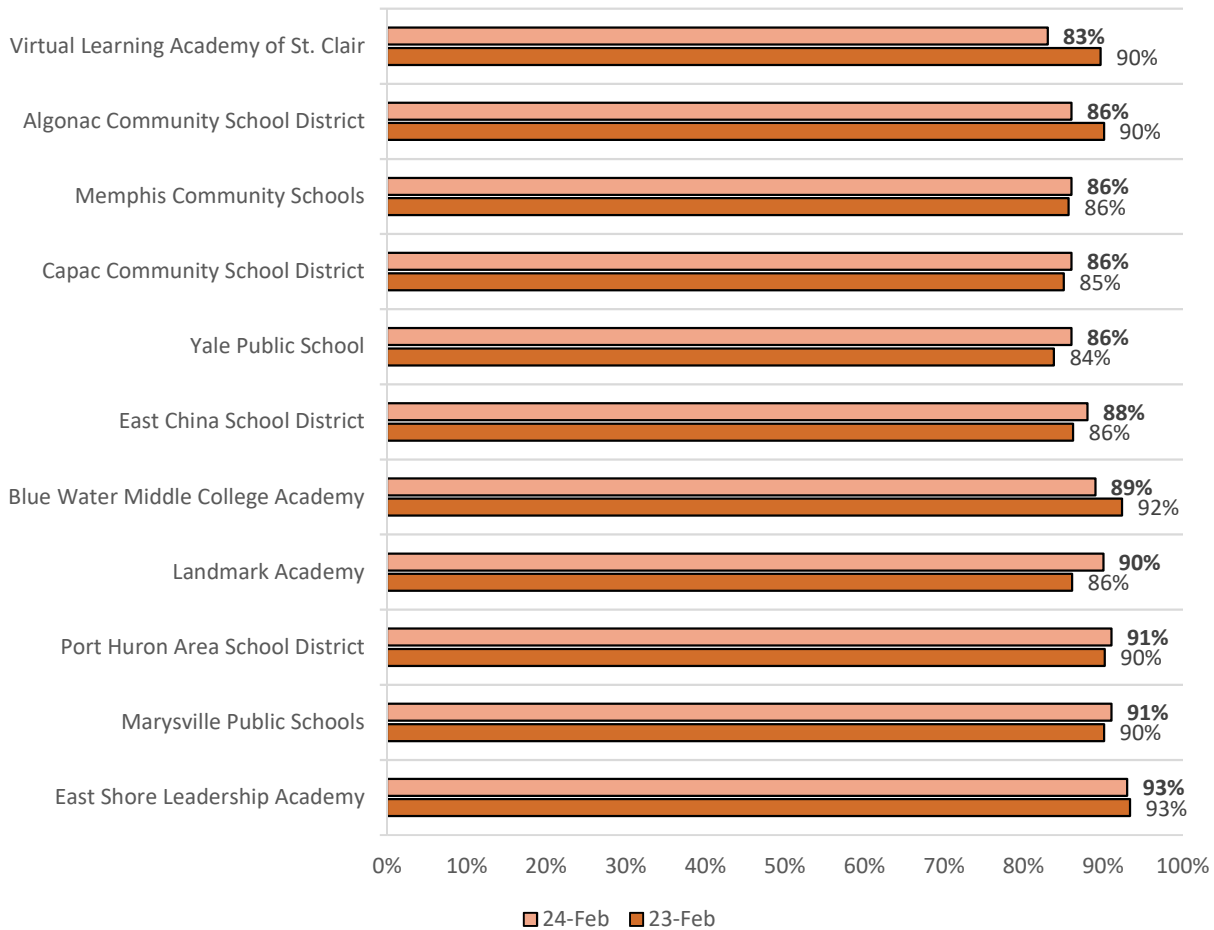
**ST. CLAIR COUNTY SCHOOL IMMUNIZATION COMPLETENESS & WAIVER DATA**

**INTRODUCTION:** This report displays data regarding students with completed immunizations **and** vaccine waivers by school district. A student with completed immunizations has all **required** vaccinations for school entry in Michigan. Students that have a vaccine waiver, incomplete, or pending documentation when the data was pulled will be considered incomplete for the purposes of this report.

This data was obtained from the Michigan Care Improvement Registry (MCIR). Each school within St. Clair County was responsible for reporting immunization and waiver data for all kindergarteners, 7<sup>th</sup> graders, and transfer students (all ages) each school year.

Please note that some recommended vaccinations were not required by the State and this report only measured completeness for required vaccinations.

Michigan state law mandates each school shall report to the local health department the immunization status of all kindergarten, 7<sup>th</sup> grade students, and students newly enrolled in the school district or intermediate school district. All schools affiliated with the Michigan Department of Education are required to report their immunization status of their students annually regardless if the student attends school in person or virtually.

Proof of required immunizations, lab confirmed immunity, or a valid certified immunization waiver must be provided to the school by the first day of school. Students without required documentation shall be excluded from attending until required documentation is provided. During disease outbreaks, incompletely vaccinated students may be excluded from attending school. These laws are in place to help prevent disease outbreaks in group settings. The best protection from vaccine preventable diseases is timely vaccination. Start students off on the right track by ensuring they are up to date on all eligible immunizations prior to the start of each school year.

## Vaccines Required for School Entry in Michigan

Whenever children are in group settings there is a chance for disease to spread. Children must follow vaccine laws in order to attend school. These laws are the minimum standard for preventing disease outbreaks in group settings. The best way to protect children from serious diseases is to follow the recommended vaccination schedule at [cdc.gov/vaccines](https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines). When following the recommended schedule children are fully protected and any school vaccination requirements are met.

Measles, Mumps, Rubella (MMR)*	2 doses at or after 12 months of age	
Hepatitis B*	3 doses	
Meningococcal Conjugate (MenACWY)	None	1 dose at 11 years of age or older upon entry into 7 <sup>th</sup> grade or higher
Varicella (Chickenpox)*	2 doses at or after 12 months of age or Current lab immunity or History of varicella disease	

**\*If the child has not received these vaccines, documented immunity is required.** All doses of vaccines must be valid (correct spacing and ages) for school entry purposes. These rules apply to children who are the above ages upon entry into school. During disease outbreaks, incompletely vaccinated children may be excluded from school. Parents and guardians choosing to decline vaccines must obtain a certified non-medical waiver from a local health department.
