Good sportsmanship is when members, leaders, and parents treat each other with respect. Kids learn the basics of sportsmanship from the adults in their lives, especially their parents and their leaders. Kids who see adults behaving in a sportsmanlike way gradually come to

understand that the real winners in activities are those who know how to persevere and to behave with dignity whether they win or lose in competitive situations. Parents can help their kids understand that good sportsmanship includes both small gestures and heroic efforts. It starts with something as simple as shaking hands with

competitors before a competition and includes acknowledging good effort made by others and accepting the placing of a judge or official gracefully. Displaying good sportsman-ship isn't always easy: It can be tough to congratulate the opposing competitor at the end of a competition, but the kids who learn how to do it will benefit

in many ways. Kids who bully or taunt others at a competitive event aren't likely to change their behavior when in the classroom or in social situations. In the same way, a child who practices good sportsmanship is likely to carry the respect and appreciation of other people into every other aspect of life.

Adults who emphasize good sportsmanship, see winning as just one of several goals they'd like their kids to achieve. They help young people take pride in their accomplishments and in their improving skills, so that the kids see themselves as winners, even if the ribbon or placing doesn't show this in the favor of the young person. The best leaders — and parents - encourage their kids to play fair, to have fun, and to concentrate on helping the others while polishing their own skills. Remember the saying "Actions speak louder than words"? That's especially true when it comes to teaching your kids the basics of good

sportsmanship. Your behavior while preparing for and during competitive events will influence them more than any pep talk or lecture you give them. In addition to providing our kids with great sportsmanship role models MSU Extension has

developed some great tools/activities to help build great sportsmanship in our kids in the club setting these are part of this newsletter.

Good 4-H animal project sportsmanship is defined as:

"Displaying respect for animals. This means exercising good animal management through proper healthcare and nutrition, as well as fair training practices. Animals deserve humane treatment in exchange for what they provide.

"Displaying respect for opponents. Sportsmanlike competitors recognize and appreciate a well-prepared, challenging opponent who can bring out the best in them and share that appreciation with their opponents.

"Displaying respect for the "game." This includes respecting and following the rules of the event. It also includes always trying one's best, using skill and training to achieve positive results, and appreciating the training process. "Displaying respect for others. Judges, show managers, parents, trainers, coaches and

leaders deserve respect as well. If one is feeling frustrated, it is important to find an appropriate location and time to vent or show this frustration.

Exhibiting good sportsmanship is not just for youth 4-H members – it applies to everyone involved, including volunteers, parents, leaders and others.

St. Clair County 4-H & Youth Fair July 18-23, 2022 at Goodells County Park



Don't wait until the last minute to get registered for the Fair.

Fair registration is NOT the same as your annual 4-H club enrollment.

You can register via the Fair web page (www.stclaircounty4hfair.org) Click on the ShoWorks and create a profile. (The ShoWorks icon will appear on the website in early June). A new profile must be created each year, even if you exhibited last year at the fair. You should receive a confirmation email that will indicate that your entry was successful. If you do NOT receive an email the entry was NOT successful. If you need assistance navigating the Fair registration system, go to the Fair office in Marysville at 1328 Michigan Avenue. Call the Fair office at (810) 364-9100 to verify hours that they will be open.

Weekly fair passes are ready for you! The weekly pass will allow a vehicle and its occupants into the fair throughout the entire week. Prices are as follows: **\$50** (if purchased before July 1)

\$60 (if purchased July 2-18) **\$70** (if purchased the week of the fair July 18-23)

There are three ways to purchase passes in advance:

- In person at the 4-H office at 200 Grand River Avenue, Suite 102, Port Huron. Cash or check. Office hours 8am-4:30 pm (closed from noon to 1pm).
- In person at the Fair office (1328 Michigan Ave, Marysville). By mail: send a check and a self-addressed stamped envelope to SCC Ag Society, P.O. Box 325, Marysville, MI 48040. (Must be received before July 1).

Single-day admission at the gate is \$25 for a vehicle, or \$10 per person. Children 8 and younger are free. Free admission is available to all on Saturday, July 23 from 7pm until approximately 10pm.

Camp at the Fair in rustic campgrounds. \$100 for the whole week, if purchased before July 1. Fair admission is included. The camping application and payment instructions can be found on the fair website:

Mega Band vouchers are \$70 per person. Available now at the 4-H office or Fair office. The voucher is exchanged upon arrival at the carnival booth for an individual wrist band which provides unlimited rides throughout the week of fair.

Jr. Livestock Sale - Thursday, July 21, 2022 2022 Sale Order: Beef, Veal, Goats, Rabbits, Poultry, Swine, Sheep Sale begins at 2:00 p.m. in the Show Arena Silent auction from 4:00-6:00 p.m. of blue ribbon poultry and rabbits

Livestock Auction: In order to limit the length of the live auction, the number of livestock species on the live auction will be limited for market lambs to 50 and market swine to 120. The balance of the market sheep and swine will be sold on the silent auction. All overweight swine will be sold on the silent auction. The animals on the live auction will be determined by market class placings. Note: Market goats, market beef and veal will not be limited in 2022.

Underweight swine and underweight sheep will not be transported to a processor from the fair. Underweight swine and sheep will be transported to Croswell Livestock Auction or Marlette Livestock Auction, or the exhibitor may take them home.

Still Exhibits will be released on Saturday, July 23rd at 7-8 p.m. or Sunday, July 24th from 8:00-9 a.m. Any exhibits not picked up during this time will be packed and taken to the Fair Office for pick up at a later date to be determined. Fair is not responsible for condition of exhibits during transportation to the Fair Office.

Shooting Sports Exhibitors: IF the State Shoot is scheduled for Saturday, July 23, the fair will make accommodations to allow exhibitors to participate in the fair and State Shoot to the fullest extent possible.

WANTED: Parking Lot Superintendent (Paid position with the Fair). Duties include setting up & marking parking lots prior to fair, set up handicap parking, work with parking aides during the week of fair in parking cars, close gates throughout week as needed, any other parking-related duties as required. Tips for purchasing and bringing home livestock

Acquiring new stock is exciting whether you are building your herd or flock, or purchasing your annual 4-H project. These tips will help you manage their health and safety by making sure you know the questions to ask before purchasing and the preparations required to bring livestock home.

Assessing Animal Health and Treatment Documentation When purchasing animals, you should know their history. Ask the following questions:

0 When was the animal born?

0

- 0 What specific vaccinations has the animal been given and when were they given?
- If necessary, was the animal properly castrated and what method was 0 used?
- Have any other treatments been administered to the animal? If so, what is the slaughter withdrawal for the drugs given?
- 0 Have any of the animals on the farm been ill or shown symptoms of illness?

If acquiring a market animal, what is the approximate weight?

Considerations as You Bring Animals Home

Transporting. Secure a trailer. If you do not own a trailer, make arrangements with someone who can transport animals for you. Be prepared to pay someone to provide transportation, as a courtesy.

Unloading. Make sure that your facility is ready to house your new animals before they arrive. Have a pen identified for new animals to go into with fresh water and appropriate feed. (Feed should be similar to their previous diet; changing to a new diet should be done over a period of time.) Have a clear and direct path to the animals' new pen from the trailer. Make sure that all gates are open or closed, as appropriate, and secured.

Settling in. Quarantine, or separate, new animals for a minimum of 21 days. At minimum, try to avoid nose-to-nose contact, and comingling feeding and watering. Minimize stress on new animals during the quarantine period. If after 21 days, the newly acquired animals have not shown any symptoms of illness, it should be safe to comingle them into your existing herd or flock.

Comingling. Since each species has a social hierarchy, observe animals during comingling and separate if there is risk of injury. Over the course of a day, the herd or flock should settle into a routine that includes the new animals.
