Program Resources - Sportsmanship

The beginning of a new 4-H year brings out good intentions from many of us, members and leaders alike. Sometimes our enthusiasm for the competitive part of our 4-H experience can overshadow our good intentions and real mission of our 4-H activities. While it is often thought that participation in competitive events builds good character, it doesn't automatically happen.

Just as a 4-H leader has a plan for each meeting or event for the 4-H year, we need to develop an action plan for learning good sportsmanship through our 4-H activities. Good sportsmanship is a critical skill for youth. Competitive events and activities provide a great opportunity for youth to learn how to be fair, respectful and gracious whether they win or lose. Let's not leave this important skill to chance and add a sportsmanship component to your club meetings and activities.

To help youth practice this important skill, Michigan 4-H Youth Development has developed a series of sportsmanship activities that can be used at club meetings, events or other youth activities. Remember, exhibiting good sportsmanship is not just for youth 4-H members – it applies to everyone involved, including volunteers, parents, leaders and others.

4-H County Medals

Did you know that 4-H County Medals and Key Club Awards are opportunities for 4-Hers to showcase their 4-H achievements.

County Medal Requirements:

- Between ages 12 & 14 OR 3rd to 5th year in 4-H
- Currently enrolled in the project area your applying
- Complete the application (members can apply for multiple medals but can only be awarded two medal per year)
- Awards are given out at 4-H Winter Achievement

Deadline to apply is December 1st

Key Club Award BASIC REQUIREMENTS:

A 4-H Member is eligible who has:

- Reached 15 years of age by the beginning of the Club year.
- Completed 3 calendar years of club work as of January 1 of the current year.
- Completed 4-H projects in at least two project areas.
- Completed a Teen Leadership project.
- Participated in 3 district (state sponsored) and/or State 4-H events.
- Been recommended by his local leader.

County Medals & Key Club Awards are awarded at 4-H Winer Achievement that will take place on Saturday, January 18, 2025.

Did you know that 4-H County Medak and Key Club Awards are opportunities for 4-Hers to showcase their 4-H achievements?

County Medal Requirements - It is recommended that the applicant be between the age of 12 and 14 years of age by January 1st if you began the program at age 9. Otherwise it is recommended that you be in your 3rd to 5th year in the program. Members must be currently and previously enrolled in the project area or related area. You may contact the MSU Extension 4-H staff to verify if you did enroll in the project area in which you are applying. Don't assume, verify. The application form must be completed by the member themselves, either handwritten or typed. Any evidence of parent involvement will be grounds for disqualification.

The due date will be December 1st. Member must fill out one application for each project or related area in which they are applying for a medal. Member may only be awarded two medals per year and only once in a specific project area for the duration of their 4-H career, but are not limited to the number of project areas they apply for.





4-H Ambassador



Applicants must be between the ages of 15-19 (Seniors), 12-14 (Intermediate), 9-11 (Juniors) years of age. Age is determined as of January

1st of the current year.

You Can Be A **4-H Ambassador** if you can....

- Verbalize you "4-H story" with the public and increase awareness to non- 4-H communities.
- Promote and assist with 4-H events and activities throughout the year, including but not limited to: parades, t.v. interviews, radio interviews, and the Leaders Council Auction.
- Follow the dress code designated to the event.
- Presents a positive role model, respect yourself and others, exhibit in a leadership role, and act in a mature , responsible, and professional manner

Help youth build the Five C's: Competence, confidence, connection, character and compassion

Michigan 4-H works to ensure that youth are engaged in a positive youth development program and utilizes the 4-H Thriving Model to help illustrate how it is meeting the needs of youth across Michigan. A key component of the 4-H Thriving Model is that youth form developmental relationships. Young people thrive best when their families, friends, schools, neighbors, businesses and other community members support them in a variety of ways.

Positive relationships with volunteers provide young people with chances to learn life skills such as goal setting, problem-solving and communicating. Volunteers can help young



people move through the developmental stages and address difficulties along the way. One important way volunteers can help youth thrive is to help them build their Five C's. According to "Liberty: Thriving and civic engagement among America's youth" by Richard Lerner, the Five C's are competence, confidence, connection, character and compassion.

The Five C's aren't tangible things you can give to young people. They're skills and characteristics young people develop through their experiences and relationships. According to Zarrett and Lerner, young people who are able to display stronger evidence of having the Five C's are considered to be thriving and more likely to be developmentally on target than those who do not. Volunteers have the potential to assist young people in building the Five C's by creating relationships and situations that allow them to thrive.

MSU Extension recommends the following ideas to help Michigan 4-H volunteers working with youth to help build the Five C's.

- · Help youth learn new concepts for the projects or activities they are participating in.
- · Know youth names and address them by their preferred names and pronouns.
- · Have youth find their spark by trying something new.
- · Help youth navigate obstacles that they encounter.
- Help youth work through the tough side of giving away a project (i.e., selling an animal, giving away a project they worked hard on).
- Help youth record progress, no matter how small; each completed task is a job well done (i.e., maintain a "Done It List").
- Identify values or ethical standards a youth lives by. Do this with them. Write a non-negotiables list showing beliefs the youth will not alter. This helps alleviate peer pressure break downs.
- Define confidence, competence, connection, character and compassion. Use one of these terms to define during a group meeting and discuss ways we show it. Align with the 4-H pledge and have youth brainstorm ways (or goals) to show these traits in the new 4-H year on paper. They can draw or write those ideas.
- Use simple ice breaker activities in pairs or small groups to help young people talk through or work on a common activity or topic. Have them share out loud to the larger group their shared connection or how they worked together to achieve a common goal (building competence and confidence, building connections).
- Focus on building relationship with the youth involved by really getting to know them (their hobbies, interests, events in school or family) and inquire about them with a genuine interest.
- Recognize specific positive behaviors or accomplishments in competence, confidence or character of youth in the club/group.
- · Be compassionate in one's interactions with youth (and others) and serve as a role model in that behavior.
